

### CV for Me! (and you). A visit to the Terre Haute Brewing Company.

Man was I really excited to receive the first issue of the SCIB newsletter and couldn't wait to open the envelope to read it! When I saw the picture in the upper left corner of the Champagne Velvet beer can, well let's just say a big ole smile stretched across my face. For those of you who know me or have been to my house, I have a passion for the Terre Haute Brewing Company and Champagne Velvet. I only live about 20 miles from the brewery and love to stop by and chat with the owner Mike Rowe from time to time. I thought it would be nice to let you my friends and SCIB members know a little bit about the brewery since Mike Rowe has become the new owner and brought The brewing of Champagne Velvet Beer to Terre Haute, IN for the first time since 1958. Mike's Grandfather used

to work at the old brewery before it closed in 1958 and Mike has always had a passion for collecting breweriana from the old brewery. Mike purchased the old Bleemel building in 1990. This was the original building where the Terre Haute Brewing Co. started in the basement and brewing dates back to 1837. Mike soon opened up a museum there displaying a bunch of the breweriana that he had amassed over the years. One day Mike found a book that belonged to Walter Bruhn who was the brew master for the Terre Haute Brewing Co. around the turn of the century.



In that book tucked away all these years was the original recipe for Champagne Velvet Pilsner Beer.
WOW! How cool is that. Mike decided to start brewing and opened up the Tap Room in the old Bleemel building in 2000 and several CV beers on tap there. Mike purchased another building in 2002 which used to be part of the bottling plant for the Terre Haute Brewing Co. He then decided to brew on a much larger scale and purchased

a bunch of brewing equipment. He sold the Bleemel building to Moggers restaurant as he did not have time to devote to running the tap room and also get serious about the brewing of the beer and its distribution. Mike currently brews about 350 barrels of beer a year and they are all lagers. He purchased a bottling line and sells cases of his beers around the area as well as kegs of beer for many of the local restaurants and bars. He is currently talking to the company who makes the aluminum bottles and is thinking about using them as they would be easy to adapt to his bottling line. Just think how great that would be for all us collectors. Imagine a CV Bock aluminum bottle with a nice big goat head on it! Mike is currently brewing three beers. He is brewing Champagne Velvet Pilsner which is made using the old original recipe. It is a clean refreshing beer with great taste and is very popular with light beer drinkers. Next, he is brewing Champagne Velvet Amber which is on the order of a Killions Red, but with much more flavor. Last but not least is my personal favorite the Champagne Velvet Bock. Talk about a great

bock beer, I have to say it's one of the best bock beers I've ever tasted. The brewery has a really cool atmosphere as all the walls are covered with tons of old breweriana from the old Terre Haute Brewing Co. There is also a bar with tables and chairs that you can belly up to and have a nice cold draft with friends. The bar is open every Thursday night to the public and has been getting nice little crowds of locals coming in to sit and enjoy a nice pint of beer and fellowship. If you are ever over my way please feel free to call me and we'll have a cold one and even run over to the brewery if you have the time.





# Striking Hoosier Gold in California!

#### SCIB chapter member pans for cans and hits the mother load!

I spent much of last year in Los Angeles, and happened to be there at the time of the Brookdale Lodge show in November. Having been unable to attend CANvention and my local Indiana shows due to job demands, I was really in need of a can fix, and I convinced my friend and coworker Chris Colombe to accompany me on the long drive up to the Santa Cruz mountains, with the promise that free beer and beautiful redwood forests awaited us.

The Brookdale area is truly lovely, and the old lodge has lots of charm. I saw a few familiar faces, and had the pleasure of meeting Stew Crook, Glenn Hintz, and Gene DiCicco among others. The Saturday night before the show was quite enjoyable, with room to room action, plenty of Sierra Nevada on tap, and lots of talk. Chris and I particularly enjoyed our encounter with the Warren Hardarker gang. I also managed to make a can trade with Chris Huber. I was not, however, finding cans that fit into my collecting interests, but had brought along a few California flats that I hoped to sell. The next morning was the official trade show, and I grabbed a table in a dark back room to display my few offerings.

The collector who took the table across the aisle from me carried in a number of totes and boxes, and when he opened the totes I could see that they were full of Rainier Jubilee cans. I don't collect them, so I stood and watched as a feeding frenzy ensued. In the midst of all those Jubilees being grabbed up I noticed one collector lifting a can from the tote that was not a Rainier.

He examined it, turning it in the dim light, and after considering it for a moment placed it back into the tote. It was an Old Crown series can from the first series, the tough ones with the green labels and little crowns. I was shocked! I walked over to the tote and could not believe my eyes. There were six different Old Crown, all from the first series, all were in immaculate condition. These were cans that I had given up trying to collect. They appear so infrequently at Indiana shows, and are usually suffering from some kind of condition issue, that a couple of years back I had just given up. Regaining my composure from what must have been a momentary paralysis I reached into the tote and picked one out. I asked the seller what he wanted for the can. He recited a more than reasonable price. I picked up another one and asked the price and the seller quoted me

the same amount. I said, "I'll take them all." Minutes later I had all six cans packed away in my little cooler. My hands were trembling for about an hour afterwards. I just couldn't believe it. Over the last six years I had, up until this point, managed to place exactly zero of these cans, on grade, into my collection. Two or three of the cans are in the best condition I've ever seen for these. This can score brightened my outlook for weeks. I still marvel at the odd chance of it all: the fact that I was the lone Hoosier collector at the show and the fact that these great Indiana cans happened to surface in Brookdale. Also, the appearance of so many Rainier Jubilees in great condition provided just enough distraction from the Old Crowns that I was afforded a few minutes before they were gobbled up. Had these cans appeared at an Indiana show they would have been sold within 10 seconds. And finally, I just happened to be at the adjacent table. I have no doubt that within moments the northwest collectors would have figured out what they were looking at. I just could not have dreamed it any better.







Hi folks! My name is Fred Goerlach and I run a business with my daughter, Eliza, called Can Works. We by the can opener. The botspecialize in the repair of beer and soda cans of all types.

In February of this year, at the Blue/Gray show in Fredericksburg, VA. I was approached by our chapter president, and my friend. Mike Pope. He asked me to repair a Progress opening instruction can that he had obtained from fellow chapter member Steve Paddack.

He told Mike that the can had been used as a pencil holder that was attached to the back of a workbench. The top lid had been cut out 1. Re-lidding with correct by a can opener and a hole had been drilled into the seam. The repair required the bottom lid to be removed leaving a hollow cylinder. A piece of tin was cut and placed behind the hole in the seam and solder was applied to fill the hole and


blended in. The next step was to stretch the can to cover the teeth marks left tom lid was prepped and reinstalled after extending the body of the can. A proper era lid was selected from our inventory of donor cans, and was installed on the top of the can. The can remained the proper height.

- vintage lids from donor cans
- 2. Re-lidding using new lids from our ample stock.
- 3. All types of dent removal.


